TRÀN ANH HÙNG ON THE TASTE OF THINGS

Talk to us about the origin of your film...

I had been looking for a subject that has to do with gastronomy, both as a profession and an art. I found a book, The Life and Passion of Dodin Bouffant, Gourmet by Marcel Rouff. I preferred telling the story as a prequel to Marcel Rouff's novel. That gave me the freedom to imagine the relationship between Eugénie and Dodin Bouffant. There is in this couple an otherness and complicity unusual at the beginning of the twentieth century... Yes, it is marvellous to see people their age, in their autumn years as Dodin would say, with a lust for life that I would describe as being classically French. Something ordered and restrained in a calm relationship with the world and nature. In that sense, I think that my film is eminently French.

The first scenes take place at dawn in a vegetable patch. Above and beyond a love letter to gastronomy, the film is an ode to life and the changing seasons...

I thought it was important for Eugénie to search for food at its source: and early in the morning for us to sense the farmer's labour, the first prerequisite of a meal. I also thought it would be fun to show the bronze antenna topped with zinc. It is a technique invented by French monks and that is good for the soil, much like today's organic farming. Farmers abandoned it long ago for pesticides. And of course, I needed exterior greenery to convey the serenity provided by nature and the changing seasons.

How do you film gastronomy in action?

That's very complex. You need to synchronize all the comings and goings, To imagine what Violette, Dodin and Pauline are up to while Eugénie is arranging braised lettuce around a rack of veal for example. We need to know that when she moves, she will be carrying this utensil. That Dodin will be using another... Genuine choreography. And a real pain in the neck.

Did you immediately think of Juliette Binoche and Benoît Magimel for Eugénie and Dodin?

I immediately thought of Juliette. Benoît later.

Juliette has unbelievable presence. Since she is a modern, committed woman in real life, she brings to the character an interior strength that makes her resistance to Dodin's desires all the more palpable. Benoît came later, in the nick of time. He was a great stroke of luck.

Along with the gastronomic arts, we also discover the art of conversation...

That's something that bowled me over when I first came to France. I was sitting at a table with a family conversing, even about what their fifteen-year-old was reading, and I was terrified that it would soon be my turn to talk. Would I be up to par? I thought it was marvellous, and at the same time stimulating and frightening, that you could voice an opinion without being ripped to pieces, and then smile once you've expressed it, without the tone ever becoming aggressive. I thought that was extraordinary.

A 1920s English seaside town bears witness to a farcical and occasionally sinister scandal in this riotous mystery comedy.

Based on a stranger than fiction true story, Wicked Little Letters follows two neighbours: deeply conservative local Edith Swan (Olivia Colman) and rowdy Irish migrant Rose Gooding (Jessie Buckley). When Edith and fellow residents begin to receive wicked letters full of unintentionally hilarious profanities, foul-mouthed Rose is charged with the crime. The anonymous letters prompt a national uproar, and a trial ensues. However, as the town's women - led by Police Officer Gladys Moss (Anjana Vasan) - begin to investigate the crime themselves, they suspect that something is amiss, and Rose may not be the culprit after all.


FLASHBACK

There were changes in store for the Electric Picture House ten years ago, as Jeff and Janet Walshe and their team, who had led the campaign to restore and reopen the cinema, passed the business on to Gareth and Samantha Negus.


The major release of that year's Awards season was the harrowing 12 Years a Slave, which ultimately won Best Picture at the Baftas and Oscars, along with many other accolades. Other big hitters on the red carpets included Dallas Buyers Club, for which Matthew McConaughey and Jared Leto respectively won Best Actor and Best Supporting Actor Oscar, Martin Scorsese's The Wolf of Wall Street, and Gravity. There was even a sing-along screening of Frozen, which had picked up the Best Original Song Oscar for Let it Go.





By 2014, Event Cinema - whether live via satellite or recorded - was becoming a major part of many cinemas' programmes, enabling productions like the National Theatre's *War Horse* (left). Making encore screenings were the RSC's hit production of *Richard II*, starring David Tennant, and the National Theatre's *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the NIght-Time*.

Family audiences were also catered for, with an increase in the number of screenings on offer during school holidays - including *Mr Peabody and Sherman*, *The Lego Movie* and *Captain America: The Winter Soldier*.


